### **SSG Memorial Day Parade Participation**

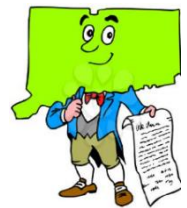

**The Nurse’s Corner**

A **Lunch, Learn, and Live** was recently held featuring Wendy Mikolinski, PharmD, who spoke to us about several timely topics and offered medication reviews for attendees. Below are some topics that were discussed:

**Medication Sharing and Gifting or Recycling**

Some of the reasons why sharing medications, or giving unused medications to others is not safe were discussed: It can be easy to mix medications up. Some have similar-sounding names, and between brand names and generic names, it’s easy to confuse them. They may look alike, names may sound alike, and they can be for very different purposes.

Some medications can have more than one form— they may come in both regular and extended-release versions and are not interchangeable. Some medications should never be cut or split in half and if your dose is only half the amount of a “gifted” drug, you might be cutting a drug that is unsafe to break apart.

If someone is sharing medications with you that have not been prescribed for you, there is no one that is checking to make sure you truly need it and that it’s compatible with other medications that you take.

There is no “*chain of custody*” for gifted or recycled meds. There is no record of proper storage that can be necessary for medications that need to be refrigerated, for example. Pharmacies and hospitals, for instance, are required to monitor temperatures of medication refrigerators. An end-user, the customer, is not. Pharmacies keep records of inventory so that if a medication is recalled, they can notify consumers.

There is no assurance that a gifted medication has been handled properly. You cannot be assured that a multi-dose vial has been properly accessed or that the person that had that medication before you washed their hands before accessing the medications, accidentally dropped a different pill into the bottle, or otherwise mixed up or contaminated the medication.

If you are done with a prescription, and there is any medication left, ask your pharmacist how to dispose of them. There are kits and home-grown methods for safely disposing of unneeded medications. Don’t share!

## **The Nurse's Corner** *(continued)*

### **Discount Cards**

It is well known how expensive prescription medications can be! Drug costs, especially those still on patent, can be high and insurance doesn't always cover the medications we need. Some people can find discounts directly with drug manufacturers for some medications – it's worth investigating. Wendy cautioned us about discount card programs like **GoodRx** and similar. These are not manufacturer coupons. Wendy informed us that these companies, in their fine print, obtain our permission to sell our data that is gathered during the discount process. She said that such companies sell data about our health and medication use. One example of this is the selling of information to auto insurance companies about conditions that might make us high risk for auto accidents. This can lead to higher prices for the drivers on the list. If you are trying to find an affordable option for a medication that your insurance doesn't cover, start with your pharmacist. Ask if they know of any manufacturer discount programs that you can apply for. And always be very careful about signing up for things like discount cards – *read the fine print and know what you're agreeing to.*

### **The Beers Criteria**

There was a brief discussion about the **Beers Criteria**: a widely used, regularly updated guideline identifying medications that are potentially inappropriate for adults aged 65 and older. It aims to reduce risks of adverse effects, prevent polypharmacy, and improve care quality. The list includes categories to avoid, use with caution, or adjust based on specific diseases or conditions.

That is not to say that anyone over 65 should automatically avoid medications on the list, but use the list as a conversation-starter with your physician, APRN, or PA about your use of the medication and if you should consider using an alternative.

You may be only using one or two medications on the list, or use them occasionally "as needed", or for a short duration, and have no untoward effects. But you may be taking several, and the cumulative effect of several could pose a problem. (Remember that game we had as kids, the straw that breaks the camel's back??). It's worth a discussion with your provider. And don't forget to mention your OTCs (over the counter meds and supplements). Some drugs on the list are OTCs, and your provider might not know you're taking them.

The list is fairly long and different medications on the list pose different potential problems, too long to print here. Copies of the list, as well as a handy version that lists drugs by both the generic and brand name, will be made available at our monthly membership SSG meetings on the literature table. Additionally, be in the lookout for a **NEWSFLASH** on this item.

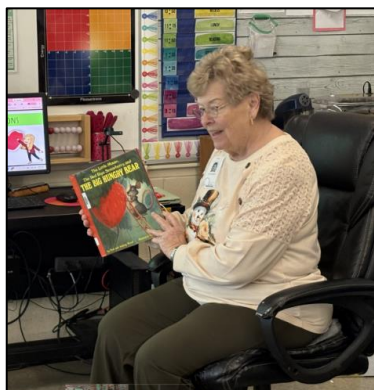
### **MDA-UAW LOCAL 571 Donation To The Veterans' Coffee House**

- They will play some hold music while you are connected to a live counselor.
- A counselor will say hello and introduce themselves. Your skilled counselor will ask you if you are safe.
- After they ask about your safety, your counselor will listen to you, understand how your problem is affecting you, provide support, and share any resources that may be helpful.

#### **TEXTING WITH THE 988 LIFELINE**

**Here is what you can expect when texting the 988 Lifeline.**

- When you send a text to 988, you will be given options to connect with a live counselor from the main 988 Lifeline or our Spanish-language (text AYUDA) and information on how to text the Veterans Crisis Line at 838255.
- When you text "Next" you will be accepting our Terms of Service.
- You will be asked to complete a brief survey to help your counselor understand how they can best support you.
- You'll receive a "Wait" message with a survey link to optional questions while we connect you to a counselor.
- Your counselor will say hello and introduce themselves. Your skilled counselor will ask if you are safe.
- After they ask about your safety, they will be calm and comforting, listen to you, and provide support. They may also share helpful resources.

#### **CHATting WITH THE 988 LIFELINE**

**Here is what you can expect when starting a chat with the 988 Lifeline.**

- After clicking "Chat" a new window with a brief survey will open. This survey helps our live counselors understand how to best support you and takes less than 5 minutes to complete.
- When you click "Start a Chat", you are accepting our Terms of Service.
- You will then see a message that indicates we are connecting you to a live counselor.
- When you are connected, a counselor will say hello and introduce themselves. Your skilled counselor will ask if you are safe.

After they ask about your safety, they will be calm and comforting, listen to you, and provide support. They may also share helpful resources.

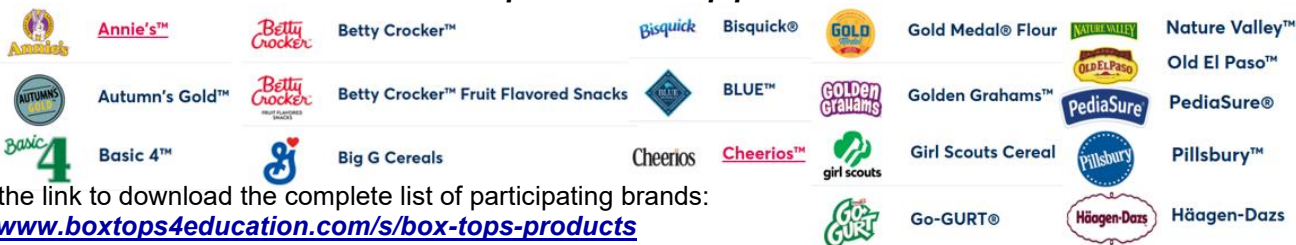

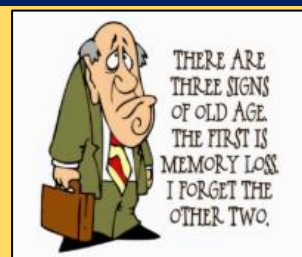
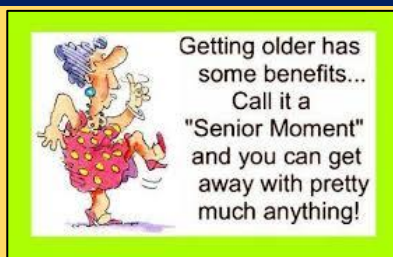
